
Seeing the Forest and the Trees: Photography through a Forester's Lens Paul D. Ries, Ed.D



Paul D. Ries, Ed.D., has had a long professional career as a forester and educator. He started his forestry career in Ohio, then spent 26 years living and working in Oregon before becoming "half-retired" and moving to East Tennessee in 2017. He currently teaches half-time in the Oregon State University College of Forestry, where he is a Senior Instructor and the Director of OSU's online Graduate Certificate in Urban Forestry program. He is also an Adjunct Assistant Professor at the University of Tennessee School of Natural Resources and a volunteer instructor for Trees Knoxville.

Paul's interests are photography, hiking, and travel (and of course his grandchildren). Though he will opportunistically photograph wildlife at times, his main photographic interests are trees and landscapes. Each Spring and Fall he marks the seasonal progression with weekly #WildflowerWednesdays and #FallColorFridays photography posts on Facebook and Instagram.

The SANP Board recently approved a change for this year's salon. Beginning this fall, ribbons for 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and Honorable Mention will be awarded for every category in print and digital. Those that win Best of Show in print and digital, will be awarded a Best of Show ribbon in addition to their first-place ribbon.

Ribbons were awarded years ago in the salon in SANP. This will give the winners something to brag about, something to show their friends, their kids, and their grandkids. The exact style of the ribbons will be revealed at a future date.

There should be another change coming that will encourage everyone to enter the upcoming salon. The dates for the salon entries will be announced later this year. The Salon Banquet will be on November 15th at Buddies Bearden Banquet Hall. Mark your calendar and make plans to attend.

SANP Workshops *by Dale Potter and Workshop Committee*

Workshops are coming. What is a workshop? It is an event where the leader will be offering instruction in an area of photography that should help you be a better photographer or refresh your skills. A workshop is different than a field event. You must pay a fee for the workshop that is nonrefundable. The fee covers the event expense and presenter's fees with SANP earning some revenue from the workshop.

A field event is a free event without any photography instruction. It is an event where you can hang out with other photographers, but you may or may not accomplish the intended goal of the field event. While field events are popular due to the price, the workshops planned for this year should be worth the fee.

Details of the workshops will be posted online soon, but if you are interested in a future workshop, save the dates on your calendar. Several workshops will have attendance limits. You will want to reserve your spot early. The following workshops will be announced soon. The cost will be around \$100 dollars, but the exact cost will be announced when the workshop is posted online.

Roger Trentham will be hosting a wildflower workshop on two different mornings Saturday, April 20th, and Monday, April 22nd. For those interested in photographing wildflowers or interested in learning techniques that work for photographing wildflowers, you will want to watch for when these events are posted as they will fill up quickly due to limited spots.

In May, Roger Trentham will host a workshop for the blue ghost fireflies. This is a unique firefly that you may enjoy watching and photographing. Roger will provide the location for the blue ghost fireflies and instructions on techniques that work best for photographing them. These events will occur on two different nights, Saturday, May 25th, and Monday, May 27th.

On July 27th, Nye Simmons will conduct a morning landscape workshop that will involve the essentials of landscape photography and scene selection. This will give members a chance to learn details in the field about what one needs to consider when composing landscape photography. There will be a separate editing event that afternoon for those interested which will have a separate cost from the morning event. Look for the details to be posted soon. There will be a limited number of spots available for the event.

We appreciate Roger and Nye conducting these workshops for SANP. Save the dates you want to attend and register early when the workshops are posted.



SANP Focus Sessions: New but not New by Julie Glibbery, Kathy Westbrook, and Hill Henry

Starting in April we will begin an expansion of SANP's educational activities by offering a number of "Focus Sessions" throughout the year. A Focus Session is a small group opportunity for club members to dive deeper into nature & travel photography or explore broader photography-related topics. Previous examples of Focus Sessions include Ron McConathy's Intentional Camera Movement (ICM) and Focus Stacking sessions at his home, and Clay Thurston & Dale Potter's print matting instruction at a library meeting room. These meetups involved discussion, demonstration, and learning new camera techniques. They were held both indoors and outdoors.

Four years ago, Brad Cottrell put the concept of Focus Sessions down on paper along with potential topics, so the hard work was already done. The Board has now approved the creation of a Focus Sessions Team (Kathy Westbrook, Focus Sessions Manager, Hill Henry and Julie Glibbery), to identify various Focus Session opportunities throughout the year.

What You Should Know

Any club member can facilitate a Focus Session. You should have some knowledge of the subject but do not need to be an expert. Attendees may have more knowledge that the leader. The objective of each session should be the interactive sharing of knowledge by the leader and attendees. A focus session might be coordinated with a Field Event on the same subject for hands-on application of shared knowledge.

Focus Sessions allow for learning opportunities on a broad set of topics. Examples include:

Photoshop basics Judging photos
Cell phones as a 2nd camera Printmaking

Infrared photography

Backyard photography

Macro photography

Creating a web site Architecture

Drone photography Photography equipment

Photoshop Focus Session by Nye Simmons

In response to some of the feedback following Dave Kelly's Lightroom Workshop back in December, I began the process of preparing some Photoshop material for SANP. The training will be presented in 60 to 90 minute modules starting on April 16th. This will be the first gathering for SANP's small group learning program called Focus Sessions.

In this class, I will focus on the needs of nature photographers rather than graphic artists. There are many Photoshop videos available online, but the advantage of this "hands-on learning opportunity" is the ability to follow along on your laptop as I project my work on a large screen.

The first two Photoshop sessions will cover setting up your workspace and developing a workflow. We will move on from there to discussing layers, how to use them, and on to editing images. I will share tips and techniques that even more experienced users may find useful.

The Cedar Bluff Library has meeting space reserved for the first session on April 16 from 6:00 to 7:30. Club members will be notified by email regarding each session and will be able to sign up on the SANP website. You may attend all sessions or choose to participate based on the topic.

There is no fee for this training, but class size will be limited to facilitate learning. Watch your inbox for an email to sign up for the first session on April 16th. Participants will be asked to email Nye and describe your level of Photoshop experience...are you are ready to learn, or are you a current Photoshop user ready to take your skill to the next level?




Hot Off the Press!




